Dear Cousin,

In the past year I became interested in discovering what I could add to the scanty knowledge we have of our common ancestor, Truman. In doing this research I found that three New England Reynolds families have been traced and recorded, so that it became my particular problem to decide where Truman fitted into these families.

First, I found that the National Archives in Washington, D.C., have documents relating to Truman's military service which reveal that he died in April 1814, and was survived by two children, William and Nancy. Second, the St. Lawrence County historian has on file adoption papers that show the children were legally adopted by their grandfather, Richard Thomas Reynolds, with consent of their mother, Catharine Reynolds. However, in every place where Richard's signature occurs, it is written Richards, and this leads me to believe that he was Richardson, born 1758-65, son of Richardson, born 1735. This younger Richardson lost his grandfather and father the same year, 1765, and became lost from the family circle. My father understood the Reynolds men were of the Greenwich, Connecticut, family, and this elder Richardson was born at Greenwich and moved while still a child to Chappaqua, Westchester County, New York. The wills of John and Richardson, grandfather and father of the younger Richardson, are included in a volume of "Early Wills of Westchester County, New York". John spelled his son's name Richeson; Sutton, the youngest of John's sons, spelled his brother's name Richerson; and the 1790 census of Stamford-Norwalk contains a Richardson and wife. John moved with his family to North Castle, later called Chappaqua, in 1748 or 1749.

In arriving at the decision that the documented Richardson and our Truman's father, Richards, are the same man, I carefully studied the following books:

These volumes are all at the Cincinnati Public Library and most are at other large city libraries. All of the information about the family of John Reynolds

(1612-1660) is included in Marion Reynolds' History of the Reynolds Family of Greenwich, Connecticut.

The Reynolds family has not been traced in England and there is a difference of opinion as to what part of England they lived in previous to 1630.

Some maintain they were from Kent, south of London, but research material at the Cincinnati library indicates that they are being searched for in Shropshire, on the Wales border. Because the Reynolds family crest contains three foxes, it is believed that they migrated to England from France and were part of the Reynard family in France previous to 1066, date of the Norman invasion.

It has not been ascertained whether John sailed from Ipswich or London directly to Boston or via the West Indies. The first known record of him in this country is that he became a freeman at Watertown, Mass., in 1635, having been here two or three years. His wife was Sarah (last name not known) born 1614 and sailed on the "Elizabeth" in 1634 to Boston.

In 1635, John and Robert (probably a brother, although was somewhat older) resettled in Watertown, Connecticut, later called Wethersfield, with several other families. Robert remained only one winter, a severe one, and returned to Boston where he died some years later. In 1641, John, along with about half of the Wethersfield settlers, removed to Stamford, Connecticut, and again in 1650 to Greenwich, Connecticut. Land grants were accorded to the new settlers evidently in a routine way and areas for public buildings were provided. John's children, Elizabeth, b. 1634, Jonathan, b. 1636, and John, b. 1638, were probably all born at Wethersfield. John died in 1660, only 48 years of age, the same year in which his first of eight grandsons was born. Sarah had died three years before.

Of the second generation, Elizabeth married a Peter Ferris and had five children; John and Jonathan each had four sons and several daughters. The second generation remained in Greenwich, although by this time there was the Old Town and modern Greenwich, the result of a division of the church. Our ancestor, Jonathan (1636-1673), married Rebecca Heusted and their children were Rebecca b. 1657, Jonathan b. 1660, John b. 1662, Sarah b. 1665, Elizabeth b. 1667, Joseph b. 1669, and Ebenezer b. 1673, posthumous. He died in 1673 when his oldest child was 16 years of age.

The third generation also remained at Greenwich. John (b. 1662) had no children, but both Joseph (b. 1669), and Ebenezer (b. 1673) had large families as did our ancestor, Jonathan (1660-before 1728). He married Neville Ridewere and had five sons, Jonathan b. 1683, Nathan b. 1688, Josiah b. 1689, Peter b. 1691, and John b. 1698, and several daughters. Called Sgt. Jonathan, our ancestor accumulated land at Greenwich and at Poundridge, New York. He remained at Old Town rather than in the new West Society, now modern Greenwich, and records show that he had died previous to 1728.

The fourth generation of the various Reynolds families at Greenwich began to emigrate to neighboring areas. The First went to Westchester and Dutchess counties in New York and to Vermont. Our ancestor, John (1698-1764), was born at Greenwich and probably all his children also. He married Hannah Sutton at Hempsted, L. I. in 1725 and their children were Margaret b. 1726, Robert b. 1727, John b. 1734, Joseph b. 1730, Richardson b. 1735, James b. 1739, Sutton b. 1744, and Andrew b. 1746. He signed a will in June 1764 ("Early Wills of Westchester County-1898, W. S. Pelletreau p. 208-209) probated in New York City (Book 24 p. 590) October 2 or 25, 1764. Margaret's husband, Andrew Purdy, and Robert were executors. His will names all the children except James, who must have died before his father, and also mentions "Richeson, son of my son Richeson" as though there were no other children of Richeson before June 1864. Descendants of Sutton are in possession of a writing by Sutton which contains most of the information we have about John, as follows:

"About this time (1748-9) John moved to a mile square farm at North Castle New York and lived until death in 1764...and was bayerd at the west end of the

meeting house was the road now is then called North Castle since that time the towns have been divided into two towns North Castle and New Castle now called Shappaqua meeting house in the year 1774 his wife died and was buried by his side...

"In the time of the Revolution Sept 17, 1778 the American army marched north from White Plains they used Shappaqua meeting house as a hospital and buried there dead in the cemetery..."

The best records indicate that the children went to Westchester County with John and remained there - Robert at Bedford, Joseph and Richardson at North Castle, Sutton at Billings, and Margaret somewhere in the County. The fifth generation had families except James and Andrew, of whom I found no further record. Our ancestor, Richardson (1735-1765), married Hannah Dean in 1758 and their children were John, Richardson, Jesse, and Ann (dates of birth not known). He lived and died at North Castle, leaving his entire estate to his wife ("Early Wills of Westchester County" p. 211, dated Dec. 1, 1764). The will, probated April 4, 1765 (New York City Book 25 p. 55) with brothers John and Robert named executors, names three sons but not the daughter, who must have been posthumous. The four children were born between 1758 and 1765 and the wills indicate that John died in infancy, Jesse was born after his grandfather's will in June 1764 and before his father's will in December 1764, and Ann was born after her father's death, making Richardson the oldest of the living children after his father's death. Hannah Dean was from Stamford and that is where Richardson was found in the 1790 census.

Of the sixth generation, it is known that Ann married a Josiah Cornell and lived at Chappaqua, and Jesse is listed at North Castle with his family in the 1790 census. Richardson (about 1760-1828) was listed at Stamford-Norwalk in Fairfield County, Connecticut, in 1790 as one male and one female over sixteen years of age. Nothing further is known of him except it was believed that he fought in the Revolution. The National Archives have no record of military service but the records before 1800 are not complete, are in fact assembled as information becomes available. The date of Truman's birth and the date of Richardson's and Truman's emigration to St. Lawrence County are not recorded.

Charts I and II at the end of this letter show how the families of Jonathan and John grew. Only the males are included because the female line is difficult to follow and many are lost from the record. Even the male line is not guaranteed complete but it is nearly so. These charts and all of the foregoing information about the Reynolds line has been obtained from Marion Reynolds' History of the Reynolds Family of Greenwich. The rest of the family story which took place in St. Lawrence County is the information which I obtained from various members of the family and from documents in the public record. I am not certain that Richardson, son of Richardson, is our Richard T. but in all the Reynolds families there appears to be no Richard that he could possibly be-- I could not find any Richard Reynolds in the early censuses and it seems it was not a popular name in our family at that time. However, Richardson is the right age at the right times and all my knowledge and the facts seem to indicate that he and our ancestor, Richard T., are the same. He and Truman must certainly have moved to St. Lawrence County between 1802, when the new county was formed by petition of all citizens of the county, and 1810, when their names appear on the federal census. The 1802 petition does not contain Richardson's or Truman's name.

Whether there were other children or whether Truman (1790-1814) was the entire seventh generation we do not know. He lived a rugged life and a short one in a rough country and a difficult period. He probably was born in or near Greenwich, Connecticut, and moved to St. Lawrence County with his father either before or shortly after his marriage to Catherine (her last name may have been Scott as the two witnesses to her signature on the adoption papers were Asahel and Lydia Scott and one of the appraisers of Truman's estate was Ichabod Scott). It was a childhood marriage if Catherine was as young as Truman, and easily

understandable that she was unable to keep the children after his death. In April 1812, when Congress called for 100,000 troops for prosecution of the war with Britain, Truman enlisted in the first regiment of riflemen, Capt. William Smith's company. The military service record shows date of death April 16, 1814, having fulfilled two years of his five year term. The children, William b. 1808 and Nancy b. 1810, received a pension (in lieu of land bounty) through their guardian, Richard T. Reynolds. Capt. Smith and many of his company were killed in an engagement with the Canadians between Ogdensburg and Cornwall on the St. Lawrence in November 1813. The numerous injured and sick were taken to a hospital at Malone and later removed to Plattsburg or Sacketts Harbor. The winter was bitter, food and medicine almost non-existent and many perished after the battle was over because of the wretched conditions under which the army labored. The manner of Truman's death is not known.

Richard, who had few memories of father or grandfather, then lost his son when Truman was less than twenty-five years of age. William was then about the age that Richard was when his own father died. The adoption of William and Nancy took place in 1817, probably when Congress provided benefits for the survivors of war veterans, although the children no doubt lived with their grandfather anyway. Their mother had already remarried a Thomas Eaton of Potsdam, New York, who did not wish to provide for them. Under the circumstances it is more likely that Richard would not give up the grandchildren to a new father and Catherine could not remain in that frontier country without a husband.

In 1828, William (1808-1882), who with Nancy is the eighth generation, applied to the Court for appointment of new guardians for Nancy and himself, indicating that his grandfather died in 1827 or 1828. William Aikens and Ansel Bailey (Potsdam) were appointed to be legal guardians, so William then needed someone of legal age to act for him. Whether William's farm was the same one Richardson worked, and whether Truman also lived on the same farm, I do not know. It might be that William sold his grandfather's farm and later either acquired the Lisbon farm or it came to him through his marriage to Harriet Sheldon in 1833. Their first child, Mary b. 1837, died at age 5 in 1842. Their second child, Hortense b. 1842 and baptized in the Lisbon Congregational Church of which William was a Deacon, died at age 8 in 1851. In the meantime their only son, Uriah Henry, b. 1845 and also baptized at the Lisbon church, grew up and helped his father farm the same land. William and Harriet and several neighbors started the Lisbon Congregational Church in 1842 and they soon built the White Church and employed a minister. They remained active in the church until their deaths. William died quite suddenly in 1882 at the age of 74 and Harriet lived 13 more years with her son's family and died in 1895 at the age of 84.

It is strange to know so little about Uriah, the only member of the ninth generation who survived childhood, but it is certain that he worked very hard to support his father and mother and his own large family. His children knew how hard he worked and the

....(text missing).... a different way of life. The first nine generations of Reynolds men were farmers but the tenth generation was not for long. It was traditional in this country for the older sons to go out into the world and make their own way, contrary to the European custom of passing title and property to the eldest son. So the older Reynolds sons left the family farm and eventually Alvah was left at home to work the farm. Uriah had married Cemantha Adeline Flack (1845-1927) from Flackville in 1869 and their children were Barron, Welby, Estella, Inez, Alvah, Edith, Leon, and Isa. Uriah died suddenly of pneumonia in 1906 at the age of 61, not very old but he had probably overworked all his life. Cemantha survived him almost 20 years and died in 1927 at the age of 82 at Lisbon, where she lived with Edith after Alvah's death.

Of the tenth generation, only Inez died in childhood. Estella and Isa both married, but only Estella had children. Edith became a practical nurse and worked mostly on private cases, caring also for her mother the last years of her

life. All of the girls lived most of their lives in St. Lawrence County, as did Leon and Alvah, who continued the farming tradition in the family. Barron worked with the telephone company and raised his family in Vermont and is buried there. Welby became an educator and taught and raised his family in Kentucky and is buried there.

The first three generation, John, Jonathan, and Jonathan, are no doubt buried at Greenwich, and the fourth generation, John, is buried at Chappaqua. At this date it has not been determined where the fifth, sixth, and seventh generations (Richardson, Richard Thomas, and Truman) are buried. But the burial ground at Lisbon contains the graves of William and Harriet, Uriah and Cemantha, and all but two of their children, as well as the two daughters of William who ....text missing....

Charts I and II attached to this letter show the first six generations of Reynolds men, descendants of John Reynolds of Greenwich, Connecticut. Chart III shows generations of the Reynolds family (6th through 10th) in St. Lawrence County, New York, descendants of Richardson T. Reynolds. Charts IV, V, VI, VII, and VIII show the families of the children of Uriah and Cemantha Flack Reynolds. Chart IX contains all the available Flack genealogy.

For all the information about the Flack family we are indebted to Una Flack (Dr. Lester) Clelland. Her correspondence with other Flack family members located a will of a James Flack in Washington County, New York, who named several children, among them Richard, John, and James, believed to be in St. Lawrence County at the time of his death in 1840. This James Flack (1755-1840) is believed to be the son of Richard Flack, one of four brothers who settled in Washington County in 1767. Una's father told her that only one Flack came from the old world and that all Flacks in this country were related. He said also that they came from Massachusetts to Vermont, to Washington County and then to St. Lawrence County. It seems Richard and John migrated to Lisbon in 1802 as they are in the 1810 census with large families. James appears in the 1820 census with a growing family. The 1790 census of Washington County has two James Flacks (our James and probably a cousin James whose descendants remained there),. And the 1800 census of Washington County has these two James Flacks and also Richard as already head of a household.

Any relevant information about either Reynoldses or Flacks is eagerly solicited. This kind of research is habit-forming.
